Brooks Expansion Update

Naturally, the pandemic has impacted our Brooks Independent Living Expansion project halting construction and requiring the suspension of tours of the model unit. Fortunately, when Luzerne County transitioned to "green" status related to cases of COVID-19, construction activities and limited touring were able to occur

once again with infection control and safety protocols implemented.

Presently, all cottages are fully constructed with finishing touches and landscaping remaining. We have had a tremendous amount of activity including calls and tours over the last few weeks.



We continue to receive very positive feedback on the cottages and have welcomed 44 new residents with future moves planned. Approximately 67% of the units are now spoken for and we anticipate that we will be approaching full capacity in the near future.

Even though the experiences of 2020 graduates are very different from previous




generations, the emotions associated with transitioning to "young adulthood" are universal. On behalf of all our senior residents, UMH would like to congratulate the graduating class of 2020!

Ministry in the Time of COVID

A great deal of focus has been spent on the physical and mental well being of residents during the COVID-19 restrictions. As a faith-based organization, our chaplains have continued to care for the spiritual needs of residents, as well. Here, Rev. Abel and Rev. Harding share their reflections on ministry in the time of COVID.

"Do not be afraid," we're told over and over in the Bible. It's been a time of fear as we continue best practices to keep COVID out of the Homes. We've dealt with visitation restrictions, no outside visitors and wearing masks. Since mid-March, outside ministers and priests have

not been allowed in. But ministry continues here at Elizabeth Church and St. Louise Manor. I've been printing out my sermon and a bible study, and handing them out weekly. I continue daily visitation, and I've led some hallway activities, including bible trivia, and biblical hangman. The residents and I take walks outside. Services are held three times a week, in the various areas and kept very small and very spread out. I just blessed a new resident's room, and anointed another resident who was very ill. We are all looking forward to the easing of restrictions, but we understand that we're all trying our best to stay safe and healthy. Ministry continues, God is with us and as in the words of Psalm 49, "Therefore we will not fear even though the earth should change...God is our refuge and strength." Submitted by Rev. Janet Abel

"When Gov. Cuomo shuttered businesses in New York many churches moved to virtual worship and on-line services. It was quickly decided that such an approach would not be effective here at Hilltop. The decision to go much more low-tech was made by Faye Clark, Director of Campus Life and myself. Each week I write a brief meditation based on the Lectionary readings that includes a prayer and a puzzle of some type. It is printed and distributed at the end of the work week at both Hilltop and JGJ. This approach has been very well received with many telling me how much they look forward to the next edition.

The second way of staying spiritually connected to the residents has been a daily scripture and prayer read over the intercom each day at 4:30 PM. The scripture is typically a single verse or two, also from the Lectionary readings, which is then followed by a short prayer. Five days a week I do the reading and the two days I have off someone else reads it in my absence. The residents have come to expect the daily readings and listen for them. Those who are interested have found a speaker near their rooms where they can specifically go to hear the daily message. This time of pandemic has not been easy for anyone. Many have asked when we can go back to having in-person worship services. I do not have a quick answer to that question that is satisfactory. What I do know, without a doubt, is that we need not meet in person in order to stay connected to our God and to one another. So, keep the faith! And stay in love with God." Submitted by Rev.
